Outline & Target

To propose and implement appropriate measures against environmental issues as a leader in the real world, anyone must have proper understanding of a society and people there.

This course aims to help students recognize the importance and difficulty to understand society and people, and develop necessary attitudes and view points for it, through lectures and fieldwork in a Japanese rural community.

For the fieldwork in 2013, we are visiting Towa District of Nihonmatsu City, Fukushima Prefecture. Towa, a rural community promoting its development through organic farming and networking, has faced a serious challenge since March 2011. The Fukushima Daiichi nuclear disaster that followed the Tohoku Great Earthquake discharged radioactive substances contaminating the surrounding region. The people in Towa have been struggling to study the actual situation of radiation pollution and find possible solutions to protect their agriculture and life. Because of its strong internal and external network capability, Towa attracted a number of supporters including TUAT research project teams.

In this fieldwork, we will visit Towa to learn from the people there what they have experienced, what they have learnt through such experience, and how they are trying to overcome the situation. One of the important outputs of the fieldwork will be a proposal of possible solutions or further actions.

Students are encouraged to take this course before conducting their overseas field training or internship, as part of preparation.
